Tips and Tools

Principles of a Successful Student Council/Government.

In getting ready for this school year I found myself once again turning to Harry McKown's 1944 book, *The Student Council* for inspiration. I bought my copy off of ebay in 2009 at about my 5 year anniversary of being an advisor. When I first got it I read it cover to cover, and showed it to everyone who would listen. Now I turn to it when I'm stressed or looking for motivation.

This year I found myself rereading Chapter 3. I was inspired by how much of what was true in the 1940's still applies to today. As you read through the list of his 26 principles, think about your own SC/G. Are you there? Is it something you and your leadership team need to work on?

1. The School Must Feel a Continuous Need for the Council. – This one goes without saying.

2. The Entire School Should Be Represented in the Council. – We have all struggled with this one from time to time. How do you build a culture where individuals from every group can work together and find a home.

3. The Faculty Should Be Fairly Represented. – Do you have a voice in your SC/G meetings? Do you stand and report? Do you answer questions while in the meeting?

4. The Average Student Should Feel Their **Representation.** – Does the student body have a say in your SC/G beyond elections? What does that look like?

5. The Average Student Should Feel Their Own Responsibility . — This is the question of our time. How do you get the average student in your school to care?

6. In General There Should Be No Restriction on SC/G Membership. — How much should grades matter when someone wants to join? Should the SC/G be an extension of an honor society? Should the Administration be able to "veto" students from joining? What about teachers?

7. Each Member of the SC/G Should Assume Some Definite Responsibility. – This line changed my life as an advisor. Every member of our SC/G has a specific title and responsibility, we long ago eliminated the idea of "I'm just a member" and yes our program can grind to a halt if one member does not do their job.

8. Each Committee or Subgroup Should Be Held Strictly Accountable for Its Particular Responsibility. – This comes with culture. Does your SC/G see each committee as an integral part of its program or does it see some committees as expendable? If there is a traditional project coming up and the committee drops the ball, is there accountability or do members shrug their shoulders and say "next year."

9. The Council Should Be Neither Too Large Nor Too Small. – I am the first to tell my members I don't care about numbers. We have had successful years with both large memberships and small memberships. It is the dedication and culture of the group that matters. If you have too many members and not a culture of accountability then you get a small group dominating it with members becoming "sleepers." (They show up and sleep in the corner) Likewise too small of a group and your SC/G will quickly burn itself out planning programs.

10. The Duties and Responsibilities of the SC/G Should Be Specifically Defined. — Your why. Why does your SC/G exist? What does it have control over?

11. The Principal Should Retain Veto Power.

12. The SC/G Should Not Be Considered a Troubleshooting Body. – Oftentimes we are asked by the administration our opinions and to help out with school events and activities. These are important roles! But we must be diligent that this doesn't become the only activity of the SC/G.

13. The SC/G Should Not Be Considered a Disciplinary Body.

14. The Cooperative Aspects of Participation Should Be Continually Emphasized.

15. The SC/G Should Not Attempt to Carry on All the Activities Itself. – Occasionally, a SC/G assumes that it, and it alone, should be responsible for initiating, organizing, promoting, and handling all the activities in the school. This is a sure way to lose your purpose. There are so many amazing organizations that can assemble students that focus in areas far better than your SC/G could ever imagine.

16. The SC/G's Financial Policy Should Be Well Organized and Closely Supervised.

17. The Machinery of the Plan Should Be Simple. – Simply put, don't let your SC/G's structure get in the way of your SC/G's program.

18. SC/G's Meetings Should Be Held Regularly and on School Time. – Scheduling regular meetings is essential to building a group culture. It is just as important to schedule meetings when your members can attend.

19. SC/G Meetings Should Be Open to All Who Care to Attend. — This may be the hardest on the list so far. At my school, all of our meetings are open to the public to attend but not talk at.

20. The Necessary Facilities and Equipment Should Be Provided. – We wouldn't want to teach in a room

that didn't have supplies in it, teams wouldn't be able to practice without supplies.

21. Continual Study and Adaptation Should Be Made.

- Change is essential! What worked with last year's group might not work with this year's group. Each year bring new ideas to the table, talk to your group about what they liked about last year and what they didn't like. Then do something about it.

22. The Reasons for Success and Failure Should Be Analyzed. – Success has a way of glossing over all of the bumps that went into it. Failure has a way of over emphasizing them. Always look for ways to improve in your successes, and areas of strength in your failures.

23. No Other Organization Should Be Allowed to Usurp the SC/G's Rightful Place in the School. – There is no other organization like SC/G, likewise there is no other organization like Journalism, DECA, FBLA, NHS, NJHS, etc. Each has its role to play, each has its purpose. Work to make sure that everyone's voice is at the table.

24. The Local SC/G Should Affiliate with Council Associations. — Shameless plug!

25. Too Much Should Not Be Expected of the SC/G. – Know your school community, and know your members. You as the advisor are best equipped to know how much they can handle and how far they should go before they are burnt out.

26. The SC/G Should Give Continuous Publicity to Its Ideals, Activities And Sometimes Problems. – Advertise, Advertise and Advertise! There is no "silver bullet" to advertising. So cover all of your bases. The student body and faculty/staff must know what you are doing and what you have accomplished.
