Program Updates CASC COMMITTEES

Extended to District Conference!

STUDENTS OF CONNECTICUT! Are you interested in making an impact in Connecticut but not sure you have the time for a large commitment? Are there certain projects, events or activities that you are passionate about? Join a Committee! Led by the student staff members of the Executive Board, Committees are a great way for students to get involved. All while learning more about CASC and its mission of empowering the student leaders of Connecticut.

Committees meet twice a year in person (June and December) and meet via zoom as necessary.

Current CASC Committees listed in alphabetical order:

Legislative Affairs Committee - 2 members, both must be HS.

The Legislative Affairs Committee is an excellent opportunity for students trying to get involved in our state's legislative process. Alongside CASC's Legislative Affairs Coordinator, this committee will work to boost civic engagement in high schools across Connecticut, spread awareness about youth-related issues and legislation,

and encourage and inspire students to become more involved in local and state level government. Students involved in this committee will have the opportunity to work directly with like-minded peers, discussing current legislative issues for teens, and developing statements on teen-related legislation on behalf of CASC.

This year's Committee project is to:

- 2 pieces of legislation to present to the Connecticut General Assembly via our Mock Legislative Day event.
- A report containing feedback on the pieces of legislation generated during Mock Legislative day as well as 2 additional pieces of legislation from the Connecticut General Assembly and their performance in the aforementioned body. This report will then be presented to both the CASC and Connecticut General Assemblies.
- Hold open sessions at the beginning and end of the CT general assembly term for students from CASC membership schools. The first will be to establish the structure of Connecticut General Assembly and legislative process, and another at the end summarizing what took place throughout the CT General Assembly session.

Mental Health Committee - 3-4 members, minimum 1 must be HS.

The Mental Health Committee seeks to spread awareness about the importance of mental health as well as advocate for people struggling with their Mental Health. The Mental Health Committee aspires to provide resources to people in need.

This year's Committee project is to:

- Host a Mental Health Night
- Create a list of resources as well as a handbook available on ctstuco.com

Service Committee - 4-6 members, minimum 1 must be HS.

Works with the CASC Service Project Coordinator to develop and implement state wide service projects and opportunities.

This year's Committee project:

- Convention Service Project
- Year Long Service Project

Social Media Committee - 2 members, both must be HS.

Works with the CASC Historian/Archivist to develop and expand our social media presence. Interested members MUST be able to attend all CASC events/functions.

This year's Committee project is to:


• Social Media Takeover



CASC, in partnership with Connecticut General Assembly, is proud to announce its Second Annual Mock Legislative Session Day in the Capitol Building on **Tuesday, December 17, 2024 from 9AM-4PM**.

Mock Legislative Session Day is a hands on opportunity for student council/government members from across Connecticut to work with the Connecticut General Assembly staff and legislators to learn how a bill becomes a law. Students will experience the bill analysis, fiscal analysis, and the process of putting a bils intentions into legal language, in preparation for Mock Session.

On Mock Legislative Session Day students will be broken into "Majority" and "Minority" caucuses which will be led by fellow student leadership. These groups will then work with CGA staff to decide if they support or oppose bills and how to prepare for them before getting to the house floor where students will debate their mock legislation on the House Floor.

This is an incredible educational experience giving student council/government members the opportunity to gain a better understanding of the legislative process in a hands-on way.

- This educational experience is \$15.00 for students from CASC Schools and includes lunch and all necessary supplies.
- Students will be discussing, debating and amending 7 student driven topics of local or state concern.
- Students should be interested in entering a public service profession or seeking public office in the future.
- The program includes 1 mandatory zoom orientation meeting before the live event in Hartford.

Tips and Tools

How to get meetings moving!

We've all been there, a meeting that is going horribly wrong. There's got to be a better way we think. Try Parli Pro, someone says, but you were never good at it, or someone else tells you that it gets in the way of creativity. Or worse, it will drive the students away!

Have no fear, here is the shortest, simplest way to begin your journey

- CALL TO ORDER The meeting is called to order by the President, who rises and says, "The meeting will please come to order."
- 2. MINUTES The minutes (record) of the last meeting are read. Example of the wording could be: The President says, "The secretary will read the minutes of the last meeting." After the reading, the president asks, "Are there any corrections or additions to these minutes?" "If not, they stand approved as read." If there are corrections, the chair informally directs corrections be made. "The minutes are approved as corrected." The secretary then signs the minutes.
- 3. **REPOTS OF OFFICERS** The President makes announcements by reading the president's report. The secretary informs the group of any letters which have been received by the group. Each communication should be handled by a main motion before another is read. The treasurer reports on receipts and expenses paid.
- **4. REPORTS OF COMMITTEES** The report of committees are called for by the president. A.

Standing Committees; B. Special Committees (Temporary/Ad-hoc) Procedure: In each case the president calls upon the chairperson of the committee to make the report. The report is read. After this has been done, the president says: "This report will be filed." Any action required on this report will be taken care of under the proper order of business (Unfinished/new)

- 5. UNFINISHED BUSINESS This is any business postponed from a previous meeting.
- 6. NEW BUSINESS Thai includes any ideas not presented previously. It is moved and discussed by members. The president says "We are now ready for the new business of the meeting." A member makes a motion, a second has to "Second it" which is then followed by discussion moderated by the president. When it seems that discussion is dying down, the president says "Are you ready for the question?" (ready to vote.) Then they vote.
- 7. **PROGRAM** This is where you might have a guest speaker or a presentation.
- 8. ADJOURNMENT Thai happens when there is a motion to adjourn, or all of the business has been finished. The president then declares the meeting adjourned.
