Tips and Tools

Preventing a three-ring circus - ORGANIZE!

The busy student council/student government (SC/G) often resembles a three-ring circus. Big projects demand the center ring and spotlights of publicity, but many other people do their act outside the featured ring. The SC/G president may be ringmaster, but needs some way to visualize all of the concurrent activities. We each need to look ahead, outside the big top, to see what needs to be readied for each project's entrance.

One system, to help develop this view, is Program Evaluation and Review Technique (PERT). PERT can be a very sophisticated, computer-based device. In fact, it was used to design and build an atomic submarine ahead-of-schedule. In total there are 5 steps required to create a PERT chart for a project:

- Identify all the tasks
- Determine task dependencies
- Connect the tasks
- Estimate time frames
- Manage the development and progress of the project

Developing a Network

The main feature of PERT is the development of a network which shows the inter-relationships among various events and benchmarks. Such a network can help you make time estimates for planning events more accurately. Anyone who has chaired or sponsored a SC/G can attest to the importance of realistic and accurate time estimates.

Some explanation of the basic PERT vocabulary may help. An event is a specific accomplishment. Ordering tickets for the homecoming dance is "an event." Two events are connected by an activity or the time-consumed between them. Designing, proofreading and estimating the number of tickets needed is "an activity" necessary before tickets can be printed.

Activities take place between specific events, such as price/date set for homecoming dance and homecoming dance tickets ordered. The time required for these activities is called activity time. This is the estimate of the time it will take to accomplish a task. Please consider the most optimistic, pessimistic and realistic time.

Putting PERT to Work

Divide the project into manageable segments. (Homecoming divides logically into parade, royalty contest, dance, publicity, etc.) For each of the major parts, build a network which will list the major events within that segment. Connect them with activity timelines showing how long the work should take.

Flow Charting

A flow chart will show the interrelationships of important events. In the industrial application of PERT, a critical path is determined which shows how long the project takes from inception to completion. This is not necessary for homecoming. You know when it has to be finalized but PERT can help you realize how early some events need to be scheduled.

The busy SC/G president can receive help in keeping things going with a PERT display showing homecoming, December charities, elections, and constitutional revision all clearly listed and organized. The activity timelines help to see when committees must be formed, contracts signed, school authorities notified and all the other tasks which cannot be left to the last minute.

Some tips: don't get the flow chart too detailed and complicated-you will be demoralized by all the tasks you must accomplish. Your drama teacher may be able to help you work out a flow chart, since flowcharting is used to organize the production of plays. Your yearbook sponsor, too, may have learned to PERT a yearbook's production. Math and computer science teachers will be of great help. too.

Effective leadership consists of learning organization, planning and evaluation skills, using the widest resources we can find. PERT may provide to be a useful leadership tool. It can help you realize all of the "acts" going on in your "three-ring circus."
